For decades, commission reports and national inquiries on Indigenous Peoples issues, conducted in Quebec and in Canada, have concluded that various forms of violence against Indigenous people still exist and persist. Among them: cultural genocide, colonial violence, systemic racism, racial profiling and many more.

Examples of such works include the following:

- the Report of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples (1996),
- UN's Special Rapporteur Mr. Doudou Diène's report on Racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and all forms of discrimination (2003),
- the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's final report (2015),
- the Final Report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (2019),
- the Public Inquiry Commission's final report on relations between Indigenous Peoples and certain Public Services in Québec: listening, reconciliation and progress (2019),
- Coroner Géhane Kamel's inquiry report on Joyce Echaquan's death (2021).

With each publication, there have been calls to action against all the previously stated forms of violence and exclusion, to denounce them and to fight against them. This has marked out a path towards a logic of decolonization of the relationship between native and non-native people, which has created a motivation to collaborate and to get involved in matters of recognition, truth, dialogue and reconciliation.

Ever since its creation in 2009, the Institut de recherche sur l'intégration professionnelle des immigrants (Research institute for the professional integration of immigrants), also known as IRIPI, has been studying racism and discrimination related issues. It is with that in mind that the IRIPI organized this second symposium on racism.

By advocating for collective mobilization and by denouncing expressions of racism, we can produce a call for change. This symposium, which is intended as a moment of pause, aims to shed light on the advancements that are being accomplished in various fields and, especially, on the aspects that remain a challenge.
